CARES Fund Building Updates

The City of Lake Shore was awarded a significant amount of money from the Covid 19 Relief Package.

That money was used to improve the offices to make the facilities safer during the Covid 19 pandemic. These improvements included:

- Moving the staff offices to an area near the entry and created an isolated reception area. The walk ins now do not wander through the building to see staff. Communication is possible through the opening at the pass-through window, with staff and walk ins in different rooms.
- We added a pass-through window (bullet resistant) between the reception area and the staff office, with a transaction counter at the window.
- We added power openers to the entry door, and the door from the reception area to the inner offices. This minimizes the hand touching of the doors to open them. This also makes these doors ADA compliant.
- During the construction of the new walls isolating the reception area from the office areas we added a bullet resistant mesh to the wall construction. Along with the bullet resistant glass the reception room is now isolated from the office and council chambers area for safety of staff and others in the council area.
- The door from the reception area to the Council Chamber area is normally locked and can be unlocked remotely by a staff member to let someone into the space after identifying who they are.
- We previously added an air exchanger to the heating/cooling system serving the office/ council chambers area. This brings in tempered fresh air to the space while exhausting stale air.

STEPS TO THE LAKE or SHORELINE WORK?

Are you considering constructing steps to the lake or creating a trail or pathway to the lake? Do you have ice damage this year? Planning to do work along or near the shore? The city requires a zoning permit for these items. Steps or a pathway to lake can only be four feet in width. Carpenter steps are the preferred method rather than steps cut into the earth and requiring alteration to the



land. There is a limit on the amount of earth movement within the bluff and near shore area so it is best to check to see if your proposed path or steps to the lake is feasible.

If you have ice damage to your shoreline and would like to it, a permit is now required. A photo of the damaged shoreline is required for the permit and the fee is \$50. It is best to contact the Planning & Zoning Office before beginning a project at 963-2148 or email the Zoning Administrator at thastings@cityoflakeshore.com.

Emergency Services Appreciation Day

Roads Report: Spring 2021 Update

Update Provided By: Wayne Anderson , Council Liaison. The committee is charged with advising the City Council on items related to the City's roads and also its wastewater system.

The Roads/Wastewater committee completed a busy year in 2020.

Reconstruction work was completed on Wienzel Point Road, Pamela Drive, Jacobs Road, Ebert Drive and Portview Road West. The work was combined in one contract to save costs.

Chip sealing was completed at the streets that were completed in 2019, which included Whitstrom Road, Pohl Road, and Point Narrows Road. The chip sealing is intended to extend the life of new asphalt roads. Chip sealing will be completed in 2021 on the five roads that were rebuilt in 2020.

The City was petitioned by residents on Robinhood Way to add asphalt paving to the existing gravel road from the intersection with Little John to the northern end of the City maintained segment. That work is scheduled to be completed in 2021.

The sewer line that runs under Wienzel Point Road has typically frozen and the lift station has needed to be manually pumped during frigid winters at considerable expense. Since Wienzel Point Road was being rebuilt anyway the opportunity was used to insulate that line. It appears the insulation was a success as the area experienced a very cold snap during February and there were no freeze ups on this sewer line.

COVID-19 & Local Governmental Updates

We have passed the one-year mark of the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic. So much has changed during this year. However, I'm excited to announce that it has been decided to reopen city hall for inperson business once again. It is believed that with the new upgrades to the functionality and safety of city hall, business can be conducted with more

thorough COVID-19 precautions. All committee and council meetings are also being held within council chambers with telephonic participation if needed or desired. All relevant CDC guidelines are being followed to ensure the safety of committee members and public participants.

The city has been informed that we can anticipate receiving another significant amount of federal funding from the recently passed American Relief Program. We are awaiting further guidance on the qualifying uses and stipulations for this money. As more becomes known, the council will again research and debate the best possible uses for this unexpected funding. It is believed that we will have until 2024 to utilize these funds, so more thorough and long-range planning may be applicable.

Trail 77 Update

The City of Lake Shore has received two grants (Federal Recreation Trail Grand and Legacy) to provide funding for the pedestrian trail alongside 77. Additional funding is still needed but the city has applied

for other grants as well as allocating funds from other sources that will cover the difference. Construction will hopefully begin in the spring of 2022. The expansion of the walking bridge between bar harbor and Zorbaz may be postponed in order to make the project more affordable. The city is continuing to work hard to make this happen for the community.







BROADBAND COMMITTEE UPDATE

GRANT APPLICATION NOT APPROVED

The MN Broadband Development Grant application submitted by the city of Lake Shore with Charter/Spectrum was not approved, due to a TDS challenge. Due to this challenge, the city of Lake Shore will not eligible for any MN Broadband Development grant funds for 18 months.

Fortunately, new funding opportunities for broadband infrastructure are being explored, both through MN DEED and federal programs.

STAR LINK

StarLink, a low orbit satellite service, is expected to be available to area residents in 2021, and is expected to provide consistent speeds of 150 Mbps.
